initially, *as?ssf16*, which stands for “a solution? systems & society fall 2016”, concerned itself with the question if “the general african is poor” and if so, “why this is the case” and “how can fashion play a role in attempting to solve this problem”.

realizing that the general african is indeed poor, which is largely due to exploitation of natural resources, it seems much more fitting to provide some kind of business for african individuals who do not have the means to support themselves. in addition, the excessive amount of second hand garments that is being dumped on africa suggests that creating and shipping more clothing to them seems inappropriate.

as a result, a guidance book was created. it includes simple patterns and sewing instructions that anyone without experience can understand and execute. originally, this was created to give the general, exploited african the opportunity to use whatever resources they have to produce luxury items that can be sold to the west. very quickly, the project revealed itself to be a platform for any individual that would like to make one’s own garments, generate income or simply learn a skill.

taking a conceptual approach toward the project, using a simple but very effective fastening mechanism allows the garments to evolve into complex pieces that scratch on the borders of ready to wear and high fashion. applying the graphic design of a vintage item found in one of the second hand garments used for investigation in the research aspect of the project served as a platform of inspiration to visualize a fashion approach to a system that was intended as a tool for self help for individuals in need.

implementing and testing my own system, the final aspect of the project is a representation of my taste and personality which is visualized in a look book. while each section of *as?ssf16* can stand on its own, when combined, they represent a journey that displays how multifaceted fashion can be.

how much profit is fair?

as?ssff16//the**research** serves as the basis and starting point of the entire compilation of projects. focusing on africa, specifically zambia, the unjust exploitation of their natural resources by westerners is highly responsible for the country's extreme poverty. being one of the 20 most poorest country in the world, zambia's corrupt government contributes to leaving the nation in a critical state.

one would think that fashion does not have a great impact in a society like this, but unfortunately, the second hand industry embodies a further burden on zambia. while the import of the west's trash labeled "donations" greatly surpass the populations need, piles of clothing keep rising.

realizing that the country is more in need of opportunity rather than fashion, a system was created that tackles exploitation. zambia's many resources can serve as tools to create fashion that can be sustainable, eco-friendly and profitable for individuals in need.

at first, simplifying a traditional african garment, the dashiki, seemed like an opportunity to introduce inexperienced users to garment making, but the model didn't allow for much user participation. this is why the multifunctional pattern revealed itself as much more successful.

when taken out of context, the pattern, in combination with the sewing guideline, acts as a platform that can be used by *any* person for self-help, education or pleasure - elevating the project from its original purpose.

by reading this, you have taken your first steps toward creating a garment that is as individual as you. moving forward, be ready to put time, patience, effort and love in to the pieces you are about to make. though the beginning may seem overwhelming, endure - all of the work will pay off at the end!

the aim of this guideline is to give you, and everyone else on this planet, the tools to use any resources available around to create one of a kind pieces that can serve as a platform for making one's own garments, a source of income, or simply the pleasure of fabrication and learning.

while this is one way of going about garments, please be aware that it is one of many, don't ever stop learning! it is important that you use this guideline as a base to incorporate and express yourself with the clothing you will make but above all, have fun with this!

general sewing information

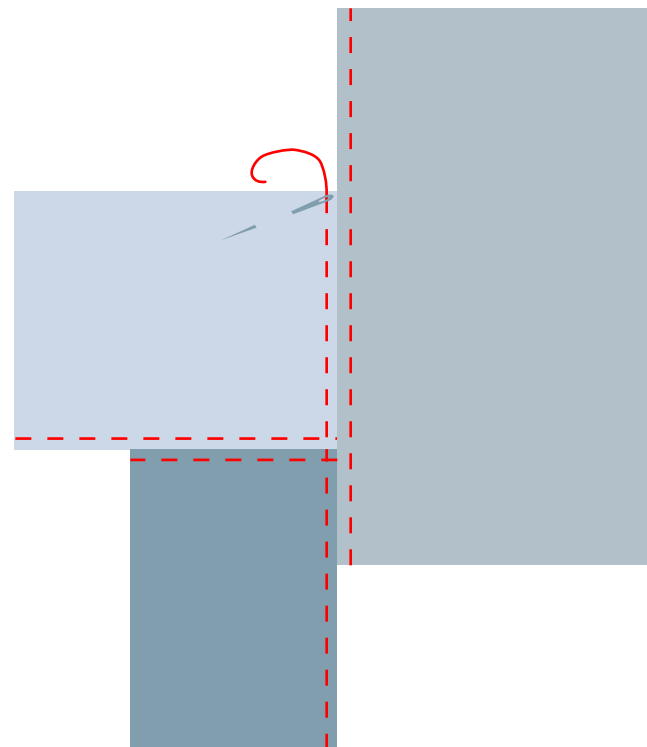
the patterns (page 23) that come with this guideline are very simple and easy to use. in order to get started, all you need is needle and thread, the fabrics you want to use for your projects along with the knowledge of applying a straight and back stitch (either by hand or machine). anything beyond this serves as base of making your pieces unique. the included pattern have a seam allowance of 1.25 cm attached, but remember to add additional seam allowance when cutting your pattern and using patchwork (see below). adding straps which are elaborated further on page 5 as well as open side seams will give your garments the ability to transform.

fabric selection

if you have multiple fabrics to choose from, go for ones that have cotton-like qualities if you aren't experienced in making garments. generally, stiffer fabrics are easier to work with than those that are very light and slippery. choosing a fabric that doesn't fray saves the trouble of having to hem it at the end! the fabrics you use for your garments do not have to be expensive in order to be good. often, unusual materials like vinyl and neoprene are a fun alternative to regular fabric. the possibilities are endless!

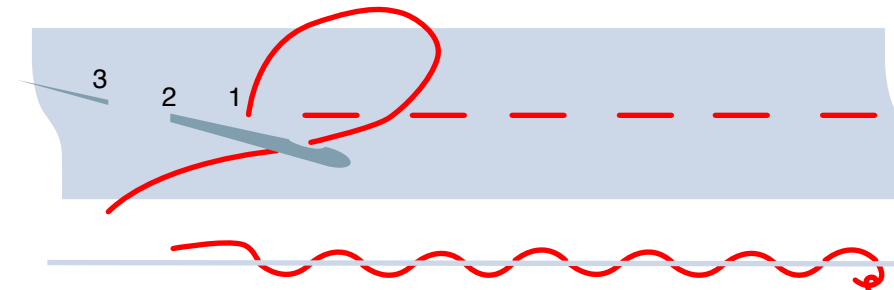
patchwork

patchwork is a great way to make your garments one of a kind. in addition, you can patch together existing garments by cutting them up and sewing them together. this is a free and environmental friendly process that turns something old into something new and exciting. use the sewing tips on pages 2 - 5 to show you how to merge two pieces together. remember that when cutting out the patterns, all seams of your patchwork need to be secured at the end of the pattern, otherwise they will unravel.



if you are not familiar, or do not have access to a sewing machine, use the following tips to put together your garments. hand stitches can be a nice design detail. consider varying the size and color of the stitches; play with it and have fun! see the glossary for sewing terminology.

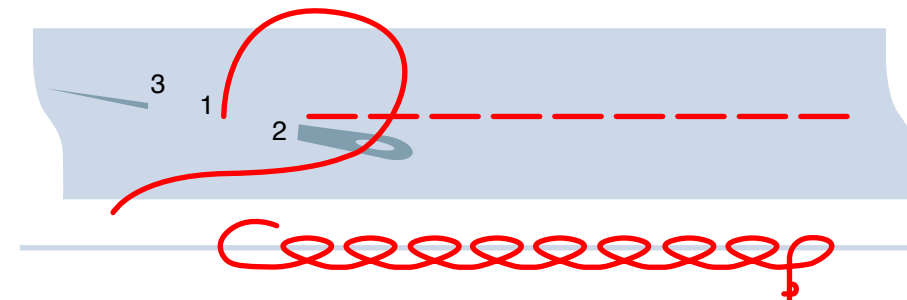

stitching a decoration

while top stitching's main use is function, it can also be used as decoration. try using different colors of thread to highlight some details in your design. combining numerous patterns and stitch lengths can turn in to top-stitch-art, play with it!

patch pockets

patch pockets are a great, easy and practical addition to any design. they can take on nearly any shape and be personalized by top stitching. to apply, add seam allowance around the edge of your pocket, place and then top stitch onto your garment.



facings

facings are a clean way to finish an opening. when practiced, they are quite easy to accomplish (compared to hemming).

1 determine your opening and mark an extension.

2 retrace opening and extension on new piece of paper.

3 if necessary, merge separate pieces in order to create one facing per opening.

4 stitch facing right side to right side with desired seam allowance.

5 flip facing onto wrong side of fabric, iron and top stitch (optional).

fastenings

instead of incorporating zippers and buttons into the garments featured in this guideline, closures with straps enable a multi-fit for various sizes, and give the ability to manipulate the garments by tying and draping them in various ways. to add this feature to your pieces, keep the end of the side seam in which you want to incorporate straps open. you can choose the length of the opening but make sure to hem the edge of the side seam that is open. there are multiple ways to construct the straps, you could even use roping if you'd like. the easiest way to attach the straps is by top stitching.
